Perspective: Risk Management



Considering Legal & Ethical Obligations to:



- Patients and Patients' Families (Specific and More General Quality of Care)
- Coroners
- Insurers
- Credentialed Professional Staff
- Employed Staff







Context: 2 "Insureds"







Physicians

 (independent contractors)

- Hospital
- Hospital Employees (vicarious liability)





Joint and Several Liability







- Trial Judge
 Determines:
 - Defendant Physician99% liable
 - Defendant Hospital1% liable
 - Total Damages:\$100,000.00

- Plaintiff can recover \$100,000.00:
 - from DefendantPhysician

OR

from DefendantHospital/Employees


Crossclaims

Obligations to "Insurers"







- Report claims promptly
- Do not prejudice position of insurer

Alternative: Solicitor-Client Privilege

- Flexibility
- Either retained by insurer or hospital directly
- In a position then to assist in responding to family, coroner
- Can also use for other purpose; but consider impact in future





May Need 2 Separate Reviews



QCIPA: "lockbox"



All can participate, but none can use



- Solicitor-Client: to answer questions from insurer/coroner/family
 - Challenge: participation of physicians





Drafting Responses



QCIPA Review



 Can disclose recommendations, but cannot link to review



- QCIPA applies to requests from coroner





Drafting Responses (cont'd)



Solicitor-Client Privilege



 No statutory restriction, but still use caution around any linkage

E.g., "While we did not conclude that our policy at the time caused or contributed to the outcome, we have implemented..." or "Without concluding that the care provided..."





Evidentiary Considerations







- Assume that responses to coroner will go to the patient's family
 - Could influence decision whether to commence an action
 - Will become a production in any civil litigation
- Emails/drafts discoverable





Speaking for Medical Staff







 have physician review draft response (involve CMPA?)



refer family or coroner to physician





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
